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Equity and Transformation

Rooted in Black Faith and Liberation Theology, voice is given as testimony to the impact of systemic racism by those most impacted. This witness is not performative pain, but a truth-telling moving toward liberation.

As organizing gathers force and the community begins to see evil structures crumble and changes begin to advance, we also bear witness to black joy, discipleship, and calling. In this context, individuals are healed (saved) by the power of community, by evolved community.

LAMENT

Those most impacted identify evil and injustice as communities help shape the prophetic demands for just public policy.

While never complete, we bear witness to the signs of kin-dom as just policies are established and systems are transformed. We see the Prophetic Outcry now as visionary.

SALVATION

The Prophetic Outcry is given strategy and tactics to directly target the systems producing pain. Healing is the complete transformation of the system, as well as the realization of the prophethood or power of the people.

The Voting Rights Act did not come without sacrifice. The law protected Blacks from intimidation and wicked tactics to keep them from voting. For example, at the end of the 1950s in Mississippi, 45% of the state's population was African American, but only five percent of that population was registered to vote. Mississippi also led the nation in beatings, lynching, and "disappearances" of Blacks. In Selma, Alabama, where Blacks were organized to fight voter suppression by marching across the Edmond Pettus bridge led by Hosea

Williams of SCLC and John Lewis of SNCC. Six hundred marchers were met by angry, violent Alabama state troopers, mounted on horses, swinging clubs, and firing tear gas. The second time they marched with nearly 25,000 people, many of whom were northern whites. On August 6, 1965, President Johnson signed the Voting Rights Act! The day became known as "Bloody Sunday."

A quick reading of the southern poverty law center's page on the Martyrs of the Civil Rights movement shows us that the blood of the righteous, both Black and white, was shed so you and I could have the right to vote. This communique encourages the saints to vote and our leaders to promote Souls to the Polls and Freedom Sunday. This initiative is a Black faith call to political responsibility. Salvation and Social Justice is privileged to partner with our sister organizations, the State Conference NAACP and The Advocacy Factory. Voters will decide the outcome of issue-based legislation and the legislators that support initiatives that directly affect our communities in the mid-term elections of 2023. This bond of a United Black Agenda led to early voting in New Jersey, the restored voting rights of 83,000 formerly incarcerated people, thousands released from prison, a reparative tax structure in cannabis, and police accountability.

The backlash to Black progress has been potent nationally and locally in New Jersey. The Vision of Souls to the Polls and the Freedom Sunday Initiative is to create an empowered, engaged, active voice for justice within our political system that will speak to the needs of Black communities. We must reclaim our power and mobilize a massive turnout of the Black vote in local and national elections to determine who will best represent a vision of empowered, healthy, whole communities.

This Black Civic Engagement Pulpit Toolkit aims to give Black faith communities everything needed to engage from a uniquely Black Church perspective. We ask you to partner with us to make this initiative successful.

The faithful should never relinguish their socio-political responsibility for the common good. We are making it an overarching goal to nurture enthusiasm for the electoral process and to reach out to all eligible voters throughout the state. Please Join Us!

OVERVIEW

The current imperative for an inclusive democracy is paramount to the future of this nation. Political democracy is based on the notion that power is shared equally among all citizens. When this power is withheld from segments of the community the entire community suffers, discord erupts, economic engines grind to a halt and governments fail. Fortunately, America's strength is in the persistent engagement and perseverance of its citizens.

The NAACP New Jersey State Conference Move New Jersey Voter Education and Outreach Plan will work in partnership with Salvation and Social Justice (Freedom Sunday Initiative) and the New Jersey Institute for Social Justice (Souls to the Polls) to strengthen, deepen, and expand our collective reach in Black communities on a state and local level in order to build independent political power for the civil and human rights community. To realize the initiative's vision of a fully inclusive government and an engaged citizenry, this effort brings together the genius and wisdom of powerful pro-democracy allies into a more coordinated network galvanized around a shared legislative agenda and a series of high-impact strategies and programming.

MISSION

The mission of the NAACP's Move New Jersey Voter Education and Outreach Plan is genuinely grass roots. It's not a targeted political strategy, but a call to political responsibility supporting an electoral process for a just and sustainable State.

VISION

The focus of this program is to create independent political power through mobilizing voters at the local levels through the alignment of goals, strategies and resources that build and advance our shared political, electoral and policy agenda. Ultimately by activating Black civic engagement and facilitating access, the initiative will promote our long-term policy agenda, thereby advancing a more inclusive democracy.

The policy of NAACP forbids the endorsement of any candidate or political party in the name of the Association, National Office, Branch or any other units of the Association.

THE PLAN

During our Move New Jersey Voter Education and Outreach initiatives, we would like to challenge our Adult Branches to:

- Assure that your Branch has a Political Action Committee with at least 3 people
- Register 5% of the African American unregistered voters in your respective jurisdiction
- Host 2 voter education events (forums [attain sign in sheet for each
- Partner with a church to host a Freedom Sunday Event
- Sample Ballot for Primary and **General Elections**
- Enlist at least 2 poll workers
- · Provide information for rides to the
- Provide information for voter protection
- Turn in monthly reports to the Branch's Executive Committee

College Chapters

The NAACP New Jersey College Chapters will have approximately 6 weeks from "move in" or the start of

the semester to the voter registration deadline on October 18. We are pushing our active college chapters to produce 200 voter registrations and 25 memberships within that 6 week period. We are also asking our College Chapters to participate in our Election Day of Action and sign up to be poll workers. Finally, we are asking our College Chapters to distribute digital sample ballots.

Youth Units

The goal for our Youth Counsels is to push for 50 voter registrations.. These numbers can be added to the adult chapter's to help reach the overall goal.

OR Code

With the QR Code saved to our phones, we can scan, therefore conduct voter registration anywhere at any time. This code can be shared at community centers, churches, senior facilities, high schools, colleges, and to parole officers for returning citizens. Anyone with a cell phone can participate

Goal

If our Adult Branches, College Chapters and Youth Branches push to attain their goals, NJSC will register over 50,000 voters within the 21 week program. Progress to goal can be tracked using the registration link and QR Code provided.At the end of the voter registration cycle, all Units will receive a list of the voters registered under their jurisdiction. If necessary, online VAN training will be available.

ACTION TIMELINE

The action timeline focuses on the political forums, Freedom Sunday, and poll watching. General Voter Registration activities to reach the above defined VR goals will be ongoing. The NAACP Units are free to add to the timeline as necessary.

CONTACTLESS VOTER REGISTRATION

The NAACP Move New Jersev 2023 Voter Education and Outreach Plan has lofty voter registration goals for each Unit.Understanding that times have changed due to COVID and high gas prices, we have created a digital or contactless Voter Registration Drive! We have done our best to assure effectiveness with minimal contact. The steps for the digital drive are simple:

- 1. Copy the QR code below
- 2. Save code to your phone and share with your community contacts and networks.
- 3. The link takes users to a form that records the registrant's information for the Branch. The short form asks for:
 - a. Name
 - b. County
 - c. Email address
 - d. Phone Number
- 4. After filling out the short form, there is a link that takes the user to the State of New Jersey where they can complete the registration process.





OR code (above) is for New Jersey voter registration ONLY. If you have issues with the code, please visit www.naacpnj.org/movenj for more information.

With those simple steps, not only have you assured that they are registered to vote, but you have also logged their contact information for the NAACP New Jersey State Conference and your Branch record.

Later, this will be helpful for "chase" programs, community messaging, and low hanging fruit for membership drives.

MOVE NJ VOTER EDUCATION

• Units will be required to host or co-host a political forum in their jurisdiction. This can be for local candidates, State candidates, or a community forum. These events can be in person or virtual. The measurable data is tracked with a sign in sheet that includes name, email, phone, and if the attendees.

- Remember that the NAACP is nonpartisan. We cannot support a candidate or a party. If you conduct a forum, all candidates must be invited.
- Freedom Sunday is an event where the Branch partners with a church or a series of churches to host a voter registration and education event on a Sunday, Freedom Sunday toolkit is available.
- Branches are to work with our partner organizations to provide information on rides to the polls. These efforts are normally local in nature. If the National Office partners with Lyft or Uber, as in recent years, the NJSC will provide that information.

MOVE NJ VOTER EDUCATION

- Every Branch and Chapter to have one poll worker
- Branch is to send out Election Day correspondence to list created.

- Find and inform community of all ride to the polls programs
- Improve election turnout numbers for precinct closest to branch (adopt a precinct)
- Each Branch should enlist members to become poll workers. Having our people at the polls on Election Day will help provide equality for voters

DIRECTORY OF TERMS

ABSENTEE BALLOT - A ballot voted in advance by a voter who is not able to be present to vote on Election Day.

BACKWARD CALENDAR - The calendar of campaign activities which is arrived at by beginning with Election Day and scheduling events "backward."

BILINGUAL BALLOTS - Bilingual ballots are printed in two languages usually English and Spanish, but in some communities the second language could be French, Korean, Chinese or Russian.

BOARD OF ELECTIONS - The agency charged with conducting and overseeing public elections within a jurisdiction. This agency maintains and supplies all forms, maps and lists pertinent to public elections.

CANVASSER - A person who knocks on doors of voters encouraging voter participation in an upcoming election.

DRIVERS - Licensed (and insured) individuals, who are used in campaigns to drop literature, run sound units in neighborhood and provide rides to the polls.

ELECTION COMMISSIONERS - A group of individuals elected or appointed to oversee elections in a particular jurisdiction.

ELECTION REFORM - Reforming or re-vamping the rules, procedures and processes that contribute to confusing and frustrating voters in their attempt to cast a vote in an election.

ELECTORAL COLLEGE -The US Constitution provides for an Electoral College or group of "wise persons" to directly elect the US President. The presidential race is conducted in each of the 50 states as a separate contest, with each state having a number of electors roughly proportionate to its population. To win, a presidential candidate needs to receive the highest numbers of voters in the right combination of states to win a majority of the electoral vote.

FELONY DIS-ENFRANCHISEMENT - In most states, individuals convicted of or plea-bargained to a felony crime lose their right to vote.

GOTV (GET OUT THE VOTE) - Those activities designed to generate high voter participation.

INSTANT RUNOFF VOTING - Instant runoff voting allows all voters to vote for their favorite candidate without fear of helping elect their least favorite candidate and it ensures that the winner enjoys true support from a majority of the voters.

NON-PARTISAN - Those campaign and Election Day activities that do not advocate the election or defeat of a particular candidate, party or referendum.

OPERATION BIG VOTE - The name used for the National Coalition of Black voter participation non-partisan activity.

PHONE BANK - The organization of a group of telephones and callers who will call registered voters to persuade them to vote.

POLL WATCHER - A person representing a candidate or political party with permission to observe the election from within the polling station.

POLL WORKER - An individual assigned to distribute material to voters outside of a polling station.

POLLING PLACE - The site at which registered voters are assigned to cast their ballots by Board of Elections, Election Commissioners or Election Officials.

PRECINCT - The smallest political jurisdiction through which a registered voter is identified. Usually the progression upward is precinct, ward, city and county.

PROVISIONAL BALLOT - A ballot voted by a person whose name does not appear on the official voters list at the polling station. It is a means of allowing a citizen to vote providing that his/her status can be confirmed at a later date.

REDISTRICTING - Every 10 years, elected officials in nearly every political jurisdiction in the nation carve up the political landscape into new legislative districts based on the new and current census information.


RE-ENFRANCHISEMENT - The re-establishment of a citizen's right to vote following a felony conviction. Most states require rehabilitated felons to receive a presidential pardon in order to vote again.

VAN- The Voter Activation Network or "The VAN" is a tool that was designed to help strengthen the campaign infrastructure of political organizations

The VAN is a database of all registered voters and it includes:

- Information found on voter registration forms
- Voting History
- Outside data purchased bv VAN (Consumer information, etc.)
- Data contributed by the NAACP and other organizations both on the national and the local level

The VAN is a system that is constantly being updated by users, organizations, information from voter registration forms and rolls. NAACP members may be trained on the VAN and assigned a password for non-partisan use. . After you receive your training and password, go to http://www.naacpvan.com/ to get started. Note: The VAN is a tool to be used for NAACP organizing. Do not use your access for any purposes that wasn't assigned by the NAACP



VOTER EDUCATION - The process of informing of education citizens on the issues and candidates prior to an election

VOTING RIGHTS ACT - In 1965, the federal government adopted to the Voting Rights Act, to ensure access for all citizens to the ballot. The passage of the Act provided large numbers of African Americans for the first time protection in the act of registering and voting in US elections. In 1982, the Voting Rights Act was amended to include provisions requiring certain jurisdictions to take steps to give minority voters an opportunity to elect candidates of their choice.

501C(3) - Non-profit organizations whose federal tax status allows them to receive and expend monies for non-partisan voter education and voter mobilization activities











What may be called the liberation tradition in black religion also begins with a determination to survive, but because it is exterior rather than primarily interior (ar for that reason it's carriers find it goes beyond strategies of sheer survival to strategies of elevation — from "make do" to "must do more" both strategies are basic to Afro-American life and culture.

Rather than accept a religion used as an instrument of social control, Black people developed their own leadership and reformed religion that resulted in the Black church. Historically the Black church, other than the Black family, is known to be the most significant social institution in our communities. It's a place we gather and pray, provide resources and a platform for political engagement.


During the 19th century clergymen such as Rev. Reverdy Ransom, J. Milton Waldron and Bishop Henry McNeal Turner mobilized from the pulpit to the pews preaching liberation and building a strong foundation to affect change and produce a significant Black political base. Others such as Reverend Hiram Revels and Reverend Richard H. Cain would go from the pulpit to become politicians, due to the mobilization of thousands of former enslaved who had been registered to vote.

In spite of continued disenfranchisement and the ratification of Jim Crow, through the mobilization of the Black church and its leaders emerged organizations such as the NAACP, National Urban League, Black labor unions, the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters and the Southern Christian leadership conference, a political arm of the Black church.

Through these organizations, with the support of the Black church, the fight for civil and voting rights has proven to be successful to date.

In spite of repetitive acts of violence by white supremacist, restrictive Black codes and electoral obstacles, to disenfranchise Black voters, the church has been and continues to be the main arena for Black political action.



FREEDOM SUNDAY

On Freedom Sunday - the Sunday before Election Day - churches will preach and teach about voting rights, voter mobilization, registration, and encourage civic participation. We are encouraging churches to appoint a Social Justice Ministry to lead in these important efforts.

OVERVIEW

We all know the liberative story in the book of Exodus -Moses speaks God-breathed truth to pharaoh:"Let my people go!" After Moses tells Pharaoh to free the slaves, Moses didn't give up. He didn't negotiate. Moses settles for nothing less than full liberation for his people.

Fast forward to today. Just as pharaoh didn't want to let the slaves go, there are modern-day pharaohs who want to suppress the rights of others to vote.

In 2012, more African Americans and voted in the election than ever before. During the 10 years since that election, in s, some interest groups and legislators have passed or attempted to pass voter suppression measures that make it more difficult for Black and Brown voters, young voters and senior voters to participate in the democratic process. The enormous amount of money and time that some interest groups' and legislators' have spent in their attempt to silence us has exposed the truth -our votes really do count. And in the 2023 election, we can say WE WILL register to vote, WE WILL not be intimidated, and WE WILL turn out in record numbers for the November election, and WE WILL vote in person, by mail, or by absentee ballot.

VOLUNTEER TO REGISTER VOTERS

In an act of solidarity, congregations are registering ALL eligible voters in their church. This will mean that some people will reregister to vote; however, there is no consequence of reregistering to vote, re-registering to vote is not fraudulent. By reregistering to vote we are telling those who are determined to deny our vote, that we are even more determined to register and VOTE. Join us in registering your entire congregation quickly, reverently and in order! We are going to contact members at home or wherever they may be throughout the community to register voters.***Identify technology that will allow us to accomplish this goal more efficiently, effectively, and safely during the COVID-19 global pandemic.

PROTECT OUR VOTE

Protect the vote on election day! Clergy and other leaders are needed to stand outside polling places, wearing clerical attire as poll workers - to serve as trustedleaders who are dedicated to and trainedin protecting people from voter intimidation. These clergy will be in direct contact with the 866-OUR-VOTE hotline

ELEMENTS OF CIVIC ENGAGEMENT AND VOTER ENGAGEMENT

Civic Engagement is individual and collective actions designed to identify and address issues of public concern. It can take many forms, from individual voluntarism to organizational involvement to electoral participation.

There are 4 forms of Civic Engagement:

Voter Registration — create an ongoing voter registration campaign! When you set your goals, consider the following:

- Set a voter registration goal and develop a voter registration plan for your ministry
- Assure that each of your members are registered and aware of local guidelines
- Select your target areas in the community for voter registration
 - Focus on certain neighborhoods or parts of town with historically low voter turnout, underrepresented groups, or high-traffic areas that will allow you to reach a greater number of people
- Assess your resources and establish community partnerships to reach registration goals
- Create a plan and mechanism to capture registrant data before turn the registration forms into Board of Elections
- Charge each member of your church to register 3 people in their community
- Voter Education— with your strategic partners in mind, inform and educate the church and community about the responsibilities of individual elected offices, the candidates, legislation, important dates, and GOTV information. A successful voter education campaign can include, but is not limited to:
 - Scheduled events
 - Townhalls
 - Community forums
 - Candidate forums
 - Host 2 FreedomSunday Services
 - The creation and/or distribution of non-partisan literature (how does the election effect you?)
 - A plan for digital outreach
 - o SMS outreach
 - Phone banking
 - Creation of a sample ballot
 - Polling location information
 - Explanations on the different ways to vote:
 - Provisional -
 - Absentee -
 - Early -
 - Mail-in ballot -
 - Election day







- Contact each memberin your community and everyindividual your ministryregistered to vote
- Charge each memberwith taking someoneto the polls
- Execute an ElectionDay phone bankingand/or SMS plan
- Execute absentee ballot voting plans.
- Development of a transportation systemfor Election Day.
- Development of day care servicesand assistance for the elderlyand disabled.

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Throughout the year and leading up to Election Day, we encourage you to educate and engage your congregation and community during the elections. A voter education campaign to educate your members on the impact of local legislation and the lack of voter protections within our communities.

We must EDUCATE! ADVOCATE! **ACTIVATE!**

Creating educational opportunities represents a community presence and has the same effect on your ministry as a membership campaign. Education builds trust. Advocacy establishes and nurtures relationships between local legislators on issues as needed. Activation is the actions taken to move an issue and ultimately create change. Activation requires goals, a plan of action, and partnerships coalitions with the resources your organization may lack to attain success.

WHAT'S AT STAKE

New Jersey continues to lead with some of the highest racial disparities in the country. In New Jersey, Black residents are incarcerated at a rate of 12.5 times that of white residents. Black people make up just 15% of the population in the state yet they represent 43% of the arrests for drug violations despite the fact that there is no evidence that Blacks use drugs at a higher rate than whites. New Jersey has the fourth highest maternal mortality rate in the nation with Black women being 7 times more likely than white women to die before or after they have given birth, and Black babies, 3 times more likely to die than white babies before reaching their first birthday. New Jersey's schools are the 6th most segregated in the nation and the most segregated in the North, adversely affecting scores of Black children subjecting them to disparate conditions such as overcrowding, insufficiently staffed schools, and limited access to resources and opportunities.

TIPS FOR REACHING AND ENGAGING YOUNG VOTERS

- Make an announcement requesting IT, marketing, and communications professionals, college students, and/or youth to meet with the pastor or designee following service.
- Share the importance of Freedom Sunday with the youth/college students/young professionals and how you as pastor want this community involved in this important effort.
- Request that group create approvedFreedom Sunday digital content. (videos, tweets, educational pieces)
- Request the congregation to post and/or tweet Freedom Sunday information on their personal social media accounts.
- Print articles messages in the bulletin about Freedom Sunday.
- Create a "quote campaign" and have congregation post and tweet famous quotes about the importance of voting daily on Instagram.
- Allow a group to tweet and post in service at a specified times on FreedomSunday
- Reward the person who receives the most re-tweets, new friends or followers as a result of Freedom Sunday.
- Create a Youth Digital Ambassador who will instructcongregants on postingabout Freedom Sundays.
- Partner with an organization that has a SMS campaign.Reward the person with the most SMS's sent during a set time of the campaign














SOULS TO THE POLLS

N E W J E R S E Y

Historically and to this day, Black communities have been systematically disenfranchised from the voting process in the United States. Black voter suppression across the country has taken on many forms from direct intimidation tactics, gerrymandering, voter identification laws, and much more.

In the 2020 general elections, despite significant increases in overall voter population, 71 percent of eligible white voters cast ballots compared to 58.4 percent of non-white voters. The Brennan Center for Justice notes that "...in the final weeks of 2020 and in 2021, state legislators across the country pre-filed or introduced more than 400 bills with provisions that would restrict voting access."

In response to historic and current attempts to suppress voting access, for decades the Black church has become a place in which disenfranchised communities take back their power and their right to vote through organizing. Souls to the Polls "is a concentrated effort at Black churches to get everyone to go to the poll...driving as many of the church attendees as possible to the poll to vote." The impact and effect of this effort through the Black church is invaluable to empowering disenfranchised communities, engaging in the democratic process, and ensuring that all we live up to the values of equity and equality in representation.



SOULS TO THE POLLS CHECKLIST

Souls to the Polls, which began decades ago, is the tradition where Black churches and faith organizations encourage congregants to vote by organizing trips to the polls afterchurch during the weekendsof early voting. Souls to the Polls is a symbolof exercising the hard-fought right to vote among Black communities.

Greetings in the strong name of our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ!

This year SandSJ has partnered with Black Church 75 to provide an amazing voter accountability tool. We are inviting your church to participate in the Black Church 75 Voter Engagement (BC75) movement by registering your church to participate in this powerful initiative.

What is BC75?

BC75 is a voter registration and turnout movement working to mobilize Black churches in America to register and turnout on election day 75% of their eligible voters.

How does it work?

BC75 uses voter activation tools to assist church leaders and staff to register their members to vote by matching the church's membership roster against the national voter registration database. The match identifies your members who are registered to vote as well those who are unregistered.

What Happens Next?

BC75 understands and honors the great trust that is given with the submission of your membership database. Please rest assured that the information will be held in the strictest confidence and will not be shared with anyone for any reason other than the matching of the voter records and returning them to you.





Choose a Sunday (or Saturday if that is when you hold services) for your House of Worship to participate in Souls to the Polls.

- o Options: Sunday prior to the primary or general election day of that year
- o Early Voting locations will be open on Sundays from 10 a.m. 6 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. - 8 p.m.

Voter Registration

- o If possible, please include time in the service every Sunday before October 18 (thevoter registration deadline) regarding voter registration or include a reminder in the bulletin (with a link to online voter registration) to encourage congregants to register and vote.
- o Sample Language: Ahead of our first Souls to the Polls effort, please make sure you are registered to vote by October 18. You can register to vote online at www.voters.svrs.nj.gov/register. Alternatively, you can fill out a voter registration form. Once the form is completed, mail or deliver it to the County Commissioner of registration or the Superintendent of Elections.

Appoint a Souls to the Polls Point of Contact for the House of Worship.

 - Follow the presentations, provide an overview of the following to congregants:
 - Location of early voting location.
 - Time congregants will leave to travel to the early voting location.
 - Share that congregants have to wear mask at the early voting location.
 - Share that congregants will take a group photo after everyone has casted a
 - Pick an early voting location in your county for congregants.
 - o The lists of early voting locations are available here: https://nj.gov/state/elections/vote-early-voting.shtml
 - Determine how congregants will get to early voting locations.
 - o Options:
 - Congregants can drive their vehicles and meet at the early voting location.
 - Congregants that do not have vehicles could carpool, or the House of Worship van/bus could be made available to take these members to the early voting location. Due to COVID-19, please determine comfort level with carpooling.
 - Determine what time congregants should meet at early voting locations.
 - o If you will be having a service at your House of Worship, please provide an early voting location and time for congregants to meet there.
 - o Early Voting locations will be open from 10 a.m. 6 p.m. on Sunday. Choose a time between this window.

Determine if your House of Worship will provide light refreshments to church congregants before they leave for the early voting locations.

Our Vote determines our communities' future!





We have come a long way since the 1960s, but we still have a long way to go since bigotrystill raises its ugly head when we turn on the news. We need to be vigilant to prevent returning to those days when an individual was judged by the color of their skin rather than by their character.

We can look to our sacred texts and beliefs about the human condition, the need to help the poor, forgiveness, grace, and mercy to assess and improve how the criminal justice system is operating in every community. If we believe that all human beings are created in the image of God, and as a result, have inherent dignity. If we believe in the importance of forgiveness and mercy that people can be redeemed by God's grace and most importantly are called to stand against poverty and injustice.

If we are to create a more humane, just system of rehabilitation and redirect resources to provide necessary services to the poor, we must support policy reforms at the federal, state, and local levels. While each state and community is different and has unique challenges, in reality, every city and state struggles with the same problems: too many arrests, prosecutions, and prison sentences, without enough services, assistance, or healing.

This is outrageous! From 1980 to 2008, the number of people incarcerated in America quadrupled-from roughly 500,000 to 2.3 million people. Today, the US is 5% of the World population and has 25% of world prisoners. Combining the number of people in prison and jail with those under parole or probation supervision, 1 in every 31 adults, or 3.2 percent of the population is under some form of correctional control. We must #EndMassIncarceration by voting for leaders who will reverse this trend!



The prophet Amos reminds us to "let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever- flowing stream." (Amos 5:24)

This year, we will be participating with other churches across the nation in Freedom Sunday Services in preparation for the upcoming elections. We, as Black Americans, simply cannot afford to stay home.

- Without voting, we had few Black elected officials.
- With voting, we now have over 10,000 Black elected officials and the first African AmericanPresident in the White House.
- Without voting, hate groups fought to keep AfricanAmericans from voting.
- With voting, we have had 2 Black U.S. Attorney Generals fighting for our right to vote.
- With voting we have the right to decide whether we have jobs, healthcare, student financial aid, and other services our community needs.

We ask all members to look out for instructions from our civic engagement coordinator (name/phone/ email) as we prepare for one of the most important dates this year - upcoming elections (add date of next election).

I ask each of you to commit to encouraging 5 family members, friends, and co-workers to vote on Freedom Sunday or Election Day and make sure they get to the polls.

Have you noticed that this year people are not intensely knocking on our doors, distributing flyers, making phone calls in a determined effort to register Black voters? The leadership here at (church name) have noticed this too.

To fill this gap, (church name) is joining the in a voter engagement movement called: Freedom Sundays. So (Church Name) along with other church congregations across the nation are registering ALL members in our churches who are eligible to vote (Are you an U.S. citizen who is 18 years of age or older and not on parole Please check your state's voter eligibility requirements concerning whether people who have committed a felony, or are on parole or on probation are le to vote** Then you are eligible to vote!) We are even re-registering some people to vote. There is no consequence of re-registering to vote. Re-registering to vote is not fraudulent. By reregistering to vote, we are telling those who are determined to deny our vote, that we are even more determined to register and VOTE. So please invite family, neighbors, friends, co-workers to (Church Name) next Sunday!

We are hosting a VOTE training for all who are interested in going into our community and registering to vote our neighbors. The training takes about an hour. DO'S AND DONT'S

ON POLITICAL ACTIVITIES FOR NON-PROFITS & PASTORS



- DO discuss the candidates' positions on issues to the congregation.
- DO lobby and campaign for or against legislation.
- DO publish political ads; as long as the regular rates are applied
- DO publish news stories about campaigns...the congregation must be kept informed as best as possible.
- DO rent out church facilities (e.g. kitchens, athletic facilities, board/community rooms) for political activities...regular rates MUST apply.
- DO provide rentals of membership lists at regular rates.
- DO allow candidates to make appearances at church events/services.
- DO distribute candidate surveys and/or voting records of office holders. DO use the church van for transportation to the polls.
- DO use the church van for transportation to the polls.
- DO participate in non-partisan voter registration and identification: these activities CAN NOT be affiliated with a political party
- DO provide non-partisan voter education: CAN NOT be affiliated with a political party.

- DO NOT support or oppose the candidates on the congregation's behalf.
- DO NOT use the congregation's funding to give financial contributions of any kind to the candidates/ office holders.
- DO NOT allow your (the church leaders) personal opinions inflict the opinions of the congregation. Please note: the Pastor's personal views and personal donations (not affiliated with the church) can be used to his own discretion, as long as these views/endorsements are not imposed upon the congregation.
- DO NOT publish church editorials that are meant to support or oppose candidates.
- DO NOT publish ads as a donation.
- DO NOT distribute candidate campaign literature
- DO NOT pay for a candidate's or office holder's attendance at a caucus or political party convention. While the congregations CAN NOT pay for this, the church leader CAN do so on an individual basis.
- DO NOT give contributions to political action committees, but the church leader may DO this on his or her own terms.
- DO NOT use the van to advertise for candidates or allow candidate discussions in the van.
